Lock Down Lambing! Triplets!

Here we are lambing for the last time but in the strangest of circumstances!

No cars hoot on the corner by our gate, no planes or helicopters buzz overhead. No distant whistle of the steam train across the river. No one walks by calling greetings over the hedge, no one drops in with kids to see the lambs, to have a cup of tea or a glass of wine. No friends for supper, no Sunday greetings in church: only isolation and "lock down".

No one knows how long it will last, when it will end. And it is the same right across the world. Suzu-Chan in Tokyo, an architect student, house bound now with her mother and brother, tells me she is learning to knit! And yet, things on the farm continue unchanged. Lambing simply goes ahead as usual.

The magnificent Hercule has done a wonderful job yet again this year. He will leave us later in the summer when eventually the sheep sales reopen. A gentle fellow, he has had his time with us. He is by now too closely related to our flock to be able to run with the ladies again next year. So the time has come for him to move on to pastures new to beget yet more beautiful

pedigree Whiteface Dartmoor lambs on fields afar.

As ewes graze quietly on the top fields, their lambs playing together in the sun, it's so difficult to believe we are living in such strange and frightening times. I look across the hills to Dartmoor in the misty distance and the River Dart below; not a person in sight. Just the baaing of sheep across the valley and maybe the sound of a solitary distant tractor way above me on a neighbour's farm. It is so hard to believe what is happening across the world. But then, once home, I look again at the news and the grim reality hits hard.



Lambing is tiring, full on, relentless; early mornings, late nights. But this year we are so grateful we have our sheep to care for. We have space around us, hard work, long days, short nights. The animals know nothing of this madness. They centre us and keep us, oh, so grounded and busy.

Chickens peck through the orchard. The yearlings graze quietly on the top fields and Hercule and the boys relax on their hillside. And down in the yard still more lambs are born. The sun continues to shine and grass is growing at last.

But everything has changed. Now we must print out a form from the NFU if we are to travel to the local farm shop to buy animal feed. We must consider carefully if we really need to leave the house. Should we risk the town or order from the village shop? Do we need to go shopping or can we make do with what we have in garden, fridge and freezer? Can we sign up to get medication delivered or is the service overwhelmed already?



So glad am I that I love gardening!

So many questions, so many challenges to all those things we have taken for granted over the years. We will surely find ourselves in a very different world out there when the lockdown is finally lifted.

Here is a message from Keith Bull, Ashprington. Just a few months ago he provided an article about The Rotary and their work in the community. His report on recent work is inspiring. Thank you, Keith.

Whilst my Rotary Club in South Africa is tackling a huge problem in helping to support 50,000+ people in the two townships where we live in Hout Bay.....all living in close proximity to each other in shacks and other poor living conditions, I thought it would good to let you know what Alison's club here in Totnes are doing!

A few weeks ago, as a result of the close association with KEVICCS school, a request was received to support one of the teachers (David Irish) who was producing protective face masks for front-line workers using 3D printing in his own home. As a result the club funded the purchase of an additional three printers and the necessary materials, which has made a huge difference to the number of masks he is able to produce.

To date David Irish has built and delivered over 100 3D Printed visors to:

Leatside Surgery,
Dartmouth Health Centre,
Totnes Ambulance Service Crews
Puddevine Care Home Totnes
Devon Doctors Locums
Second Care home in Totnes.

David is receiving more enquiries each day and we expect the final figure to exceed 250-300 individual users. Each item will last approx. max of 2+ weeks of continual use and then need to be replaced. We are currently sourcing adjustable elastic for the visor fittings and we should be able to get that to David tomorrow. That will allow him to deliver an additional 50 visors immediately.

David is manufacturing two types of visor:

Type 1: 3D Printed and optimised for continuous use by nurses, doctors, and others who need to be protected for a whole shift. These are designed for comfort and are robust and can be re-sanitised so that they can last for a period of time. They are from a proven 'open source' design, made available from Europe.

They have already already been delivered to over 200 very grateful NHS and related front line staff in Totnes, Torbay and Dartmouth, including Health Centres, Doctors, Nurses, Ambulance crews, specialist care home staff and as at this morning they will also be provided to the local 'Boot's' Pharmacists. David will continue to produce the visors to replace the initial supply ones as they become worn-out. Our additional purchased 3 machines should come fully on stream next week and these will significantly increase the production rate.

Type 2: These are a 'lighter use' variant, designed to be worn when necessary in place such as Care Homes or NHS facilities not directly COVID-19 focused. They can be produced more rapidly by Laser Cutter rather than 3D printer and as such the

volume can be easily ramped up.

The commissioning of a second laser cutter next week will double David's capability.

Yesterday we were able to deliver 100m of the specialised elastic which allows the visors to be adjusted for maximum comfort which is so important during extended periods of wear. This material is in short supply locally and I would like to express our thanks to Rebecca and Nick Ingoe of 'Ultimate Fabrics' in Churchstow who were able to source the material from one of their specialist customers in Scotland! This will allow David to quickly finish and deliver another 50+ urgently needed visors.

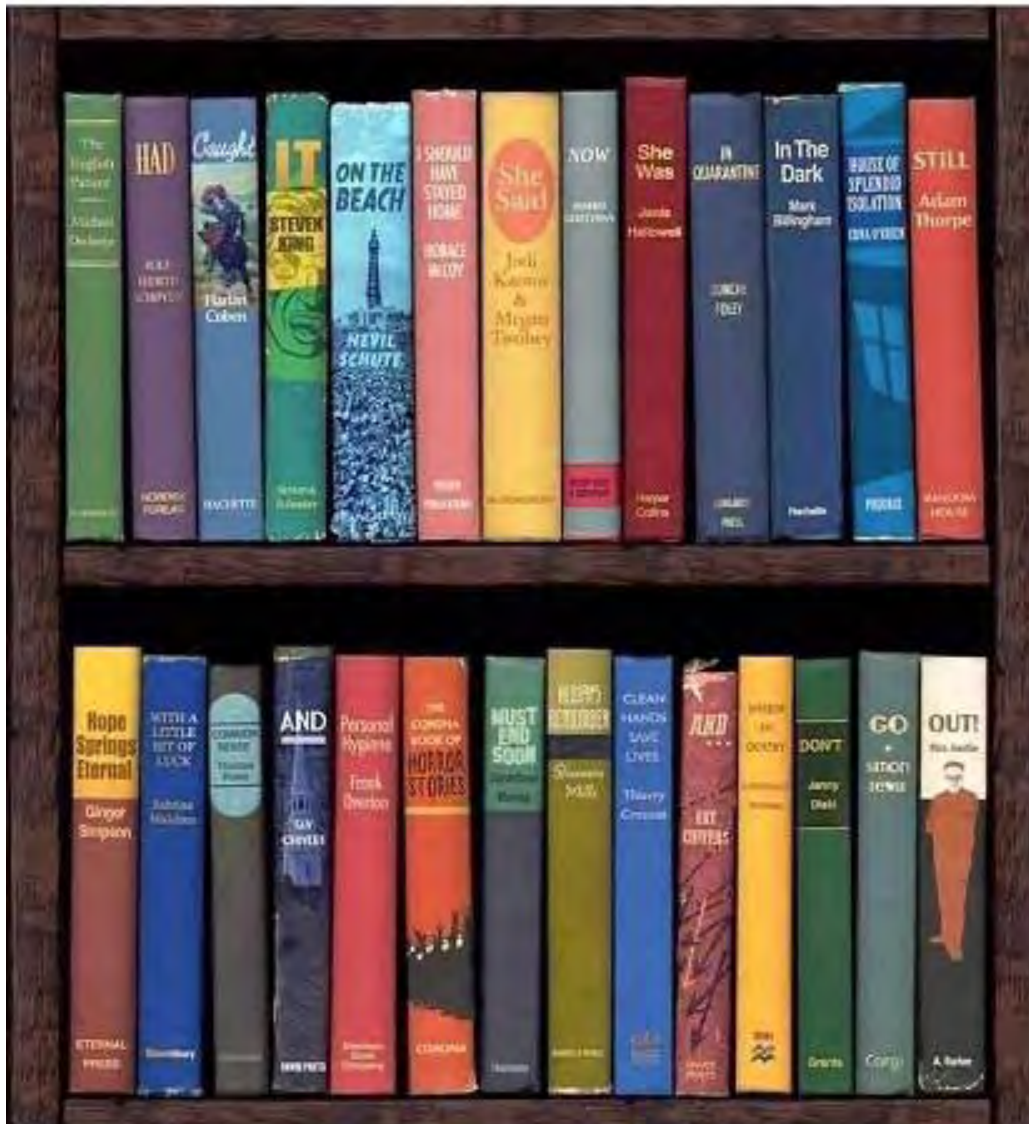

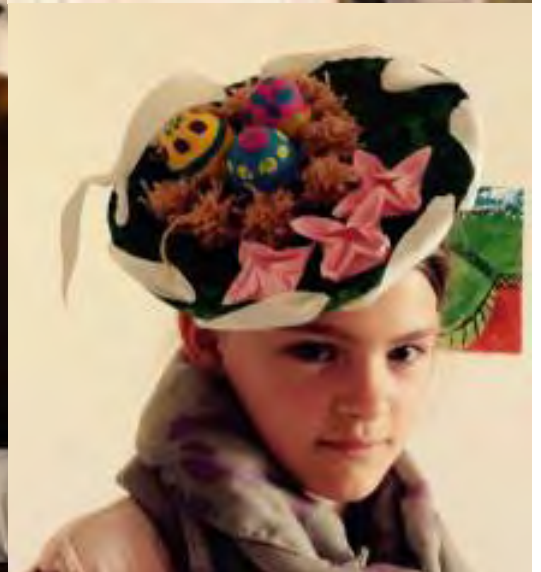

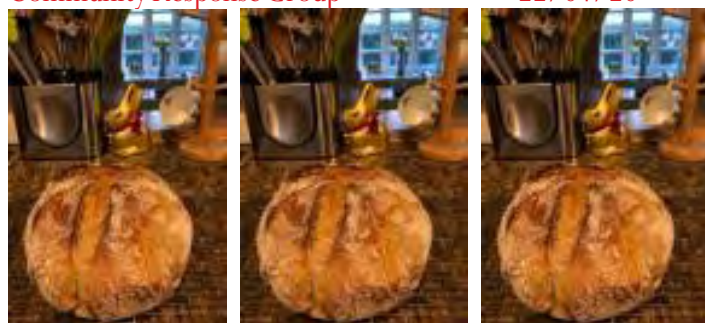
Alternatively I am told that the Sourdough at the Emily's Pop Up Shop is excellent.

COVID-19: Ash Meadow remains open for use by all our community, for play, relaxation, or a bit of exercise. In this rapidly changing situation advice/regulations may change, so please be aware of this. But please follow the advice we have all been given about keeping a safe distance from others. Air Ambulance Landing Site Appeal: Our community has responded to this appeal in a truly outstanding fashion. With a target of £2,500, the local appeal has raised a total of £2,340 so far, which leaves just £160 to go before the Autumn. With such a positive result so far, the planning application has been submitted.

Sent in by St David's PCC Secretary - The Lighter Side of Easter this year.

The Ashprington Airmen.

The three wooden crosses on the War Memorial for the month of May commemorate three airmen who lost their lives during World War Two.

Leading Aircraftman Wallace Hutchings 116725, RAF Volunteer Reserve.

LAC Hutchings was either aircraft maintenance or trainee aircrew. He was the son of George and Annie Hutchings and nephew of Gunner Thomas Hutchings and Private Ernest Hutchings who were killed in the First World War. He lived in a thatched cottage, demolished in 1956 and replaced by Coombe Cottage, opposite the former Post Office and worked for the Rogers family at Coombe Farm.

According to the Malta Memorial LAC Hutchings was killed in a 'Raid or Sortie' somewhere in the Mediterranean area on December 2nd 1943 aged 38. He has no known grave and was the only Ashprington airman killed by enemy action.

Sergeant Stephen Richard Life 1701209, 115 Squadron RAF Volunteer Reserve.

Sergeant Life was the son of Thomas Ford Life and Lily Lousisa life of Peeke's Cottage, Washbourne. His father was a blacksmith and he was a nephew of Private Stephen Life who was killed the First World War.

From an early age Stephen Life wanted to fly. He worked as a mechanic at Reeves' timber yard in Totnes before joining the RAFVR in 1943. He qualified as a flight engineer and flew in Lancaster bombers in raids on German industrial sites in 115 Squadron.

On March 24th 1944, the day of the Great Escape from Stalag Luft III, Sgt. Life was badly wounded while flying in a Lancaster on a raid on Nuremberg in what proved to be Bomber Command's worst day. Over 700 bombers took part, 95 were lost, and 595 airmen killed.

While recovering from his wounds Sgt. Life took a sailing boat out in the Wash and was, according to his death certificate, 'found drowned having lost his life on the 11th June 1944 by the accidental overturning of a sailing boat', at Denver Sluice, Downham. He was nineteen years old and unmarried. Sgt. Life is buried in Cambridge City Cemetery.

Leading Aircraftman Norman Chope 1184666 RAF Volunteer Reserve.

LAC Norman Chope was the son of Matthew John Chope and Ellen Chope of Perchwood Cottages, Tuckenhay, one of a pair of tied cottages of Perchwood Farm. His father worked as a driver for the Manning family who owned Perchwood Farm and the cider works, quay and coal and manure stores. Norman went to Ashprington School and grew into a tall man.

He worked for the Lewis family, builders, of Washbourne. In 1941 he married Julia Mahala Chope, from St Tudy, Cornwall, a former nanny to the Dakers family at Yetson House and had a daughter named Judy.

In 1945 LAC Chope was inoculated so that he could be sent abroad to Europe or the Far East. He developed septicaemia and died several weeks later at the age of thirty two. He is buried in St David's Churchyard, Ashprington, in an unusual RAF grave which is regularly maintained by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. After LAC Chope's

death his widow and daughter moved back to Cornwall. Julia Chope died in 1983.



The Parish Council feel it is important to mark VE Day especially during these difficult times. So, with this in mind we have arranged for a short acknowledgement on Friday May the 8th.

At 2.40 in the afternoon an air raid siren will sound out across the villages letting us know that 6 minutes of Churchill speeches will be played out across the village loud enough for everyone to hear from their garden, Stay tuned for further announcements once the national celebrations have been finalised. I hope you all can join us.

- Cut them on Thursday, you cut them for wealth.

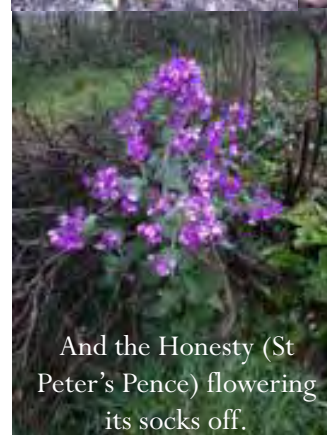
So perhaps by next month we will know the day upon which the government cut theirs. No mention of biting them given in the handbook.

Notes from the Monthly Meeting on Wednesday 4 March 2020 at 7:00 p.m.

Present: Cllrs Faulkner (meeting Chair), Bond, and Green, Devon County Cllr Hawkins, six members of the public, and A Thom (Clerk).

The request from Blackberry Cottage for Key to Lockable Post was agreed. The request for members of South West Gaffers to again camp on The Ham / stay in campervans in The Ham car park from Friday 14 August to leave by Monday 17 August, to participate in Dittisham Regatta was approved. Members of the public were present to request the Parish Council's support for an application to register as a new Public Right of Way the pedestrian access between Riverside Road, just west of the Football Field, to The Level. This request will be on the April agenda. A resident raised their concern that many sensor activated lights in the village illuminate the roads. They said that this is not legal and that the lights need to be adjusted so that they illuminate only the private property, and requested DPC take action.

South Hams District Council Councillor

Deferred in the absence of Cllr McKay.

Devon County Council Councillor

DCC's annual budget increases its Council Tax demand by the maximum of 3.9 recurring percent. Storm Dennis did two to three hundred thousand pounds damage to roads. Cllr Hawkins has had several meetings with a group trying to improve the transport system in the Dartmouth area. They are hoping to access some of a pot of one million pounds, to spend on a community bus service linking Dartmouth, communities and Totnes, with the Willows. The planning application for the Dartmouth Health and Well Being Centre will be submitted later this month. The bottom level of the Riverview Nursing Home is being rented for use as a small care home. Use of the Dartmouth Food Bank has rocketed and they are seeing 12-15 cases per week. A small police station office will be located next door to the Ambulance station. The Mayflower 400th anniversary commemoration plans are progressing well. Cllrs raised concerns about the proposed loss of the red diesel subsidy - advised a matter to raise with Anthony Mangnall MP, and replacement of the teardrop road marking at the Sportsman's Arms following the recent roadworks.

The Second Sunday of Easter 2020

The Mission Commission

Imagine that you were in the Upper Room with the disciples on the evening of that first Easter Sunday. On Maundy Thursday you had fled from the Garden of Gethsemane, in fear of your life. On Good Friday and Holy Saturday you had been in misery in hiding. You followed Jesus the Nazarene for three years. Now your teacher is dead. You all stayed in the Upper Room during these days to keep off the streets for fear of arrest and execution. Then, in the early morning of the Sunday, Mary Magdalene and some of the other women in the group turned up in a state of uncontrollable shock and excitement, saying that Jesus had come back to life! Taking a huge risk, Peter and John ran to the tomb, and found it empty. They did not know what to make of the empty tomb. Could Jesus really be alive? Then during the day on the Sunday, Peter slipped out for a short while and when he came back he was white as a sheet and said that he too had seen Jesus – alive! Peter was plainly in shock. You wondered - were people just seeing what they wanted to see, or was Jesus really alive? Then during that evening two of the disciples who had travelled out to Emmaus suddenly appeared at the door, breathless after running all the way back to Jerusalem. They too claimed to have seen Jesus, although to start with they said they didn't realise that it was Jesus. Can you imagine the excitement, the confusion, the fear, the hope that you might be feeling? And then, in an instant, there He was. Stood right in the room with you all. Out of nowhere. Only Thomas was not there. You find it hard to breathe as you try and comprehend what your eyes seem to be showing you. Jesus – alive! It is Him. He shows you his wounds. You can touch Him. It is Him! Jesus says to you all – Shalom (peace).

Which in the new Christian context is a community greeting, a command to dissipate anxiety, and a statement of the reality of God's future Kingdom for those who have found peace with God through Christ. Then, without checking in to see how everyone was doing, Jesus immediately sets out the divine mission for His small band of disciples, provides the enablement for them to fulfil it, and demonstrates how to lead people into the Kingdom of God. Can you sense the urgency in Jesus for His disciples to get to the task of sharing the Gospel of love with the community about them? We learn here that mission was never an afterthought for Jesus. It was always a first principle.

Setting the Mission

Jesus sets the mission before His disciples by saying, 'As the Father has sent me, so I send you.' God the Father sent Jesus into the world, which was a pretty hostile place for Him. When He finished His task, He then sent the disciples into a largely hostile world to complete their mission. The principle point that you and I are to understand here is that we are a sent people. I don't believe that it is theologically possible to be a Christian and not to be sent with a message of hope to some people or other. Some people are sent to tribes deep in the Amazonian jungle. Some people are sent to the slums of New Delhi, India. Some people are sent to Whitechapel in London. Some people are sent to the people in their families, or next door to them. We are all sent to someone. To whom are you sent?





The Second Sunday of Easter 2020

Enabling the Mission

In breathing on the disciples and saying, 'Receive the Holy Spirit', Jesus is telling them that a specific enablement is going to come upon them in 40 days' time. They didn't need to worry about having all of the gifts and abilities to do the job, because the Holy Spirit, when He came, would give them all that they needed. When we make ourselves available to God, by faith, He always equips us. Do you have all that you need to do mission? Have you asked God, through the Holy Spirit, to specially enable you? Ask and He will provide!

Effecting Mission

Doubting Thomas wasn't missing by accident. I believe that Jesus intentionally came when Thomas wasn't there. Out of a love for Thomas, and out of love for the millions of doubting Thomas's in the world, Jesus came back when Thomas was there. And what did Jesus do with and for Thomas when He returned? He proved that He was the Christ. And what a response from Thomas when Jesus did that!

That is now our role in mission. Our job is to be close and compassionate with those people who doubt that Jesus rose from the dead, and that He is the Christ. Our job is to persuade them of the reality of who He is. Now you do not need to be a theologian to do that. The simplest, and perhaps the most profound, way to do that is to share with people how knowing

the risen Christ has utterly changed you and your life. People can argue with our theology all day long – it is much harder for people to challenge the testimony of a transformed life.

Our Acts passage today is also important, because it shows the Apostles seizing hold of this call of being sent into the world as missionaries. Right after the coming of the Holy Spirit upon them to enable them and empower them, they are out in public proving to the masses that Jesus is the Risen Christ. So, in the days now before us, this same opportunity presents itself. We are still a sent people. We are still an empowered people. And we are still people who are tasked with revealing to a waiting world just who Jesus the Christ is.

The Main Thing is.....



I am a creature of habit. I function best when I have a clear routine, so you can imagine the impact that the last few weeks has had on me.

Julian and Jane Ould have barely been gone six weeks but ministerial life and life as a whole has changed beyond recognition and it's been a challenge to respond to the pace of change and the ongoing uncertainty about how long the current modus operandi will last in a Team which is both large and complex.

Add to that having to let go of all that had been prepared for Holy Week and Easter and rethink how to celebrate one of the major religious festival's of the year, when we were not able to gather together in church buildings, whilst also preparing for Steve's departure, Jim's arrival and the practical implications around re-arranging weddings, baptisms, APCMs, Diocesan training programmes, installations and usual church business, it is little wonder that four weeks' into lock down, my brain is feeling rather like scrambled egg and my body is longing for a holiday! Whilst there are clearly many benefits to using technology, in terms of reaching a wide range of people, too much screen time is mentally exhausting when the usual buffer of travelling to and from meetings has been erased.

The airwaves and my in-tray have been awash with guidelines and advice about how to respond in the current climate, so much so that there is a danger of information overload. I wonder whether you are feeling the same?

So how do we see the wood for the trees and keep rooted in these turbulent times?

The best advice I have heard was from the new Warden at Lee Abbey, Rev'd. Gordon Crowther. If I think I have had a baptism of fire in this interregnum, I feel deep sympathy for him and his wife, who had only been in post for a few days before the lockdown happened and they were forced to close the house to guests and let go of half their resident community.

He said that the best advice he had ever received in his life was from J John, who said: "The main thing is to keep the main thing, the main thing!" It's so simple isn't it and yet so profound.

So perhaps as we live in the present moment and look to the future, we might ask ourselves individually and corporately how we keep the main thing, the main thing? How do we put our relationship with the living God at the centre of all that we do and love our neighbour as our self.

Totnes Street Pastors Update

Currently all our shifts are suspended. The average age in our teams is 65 with several 70+ and in accordance with government guidelines, we are not out on the streets on Fridays at the moment.

Those who would have been on duty (we are keeping to our rota) either on the streets or at Base or giving phone support from home, are asked to give feedback which I share with everyone and this helps inform our prayers.

This week, Laurence and Kathi from St David's Ashprington were due on duty and they prepared this small liturgy for us all to use. I thought others might find it helpful. Kathi prays and supports the teams at Base and Laurence is a Street Pastor.

Update on Totnes Connection Hub and Food Bank

Food Bank and Totnes Connection Hub

The Totnes Team continues to be a fantastic support to the Hub and Food Bank. Thank you so very much. Each Monday I have a TTC Zoom meeting with a wide range of councillors, Totnes Caring, Leatside Food in Community and the Hub among others. Our MP also joins the meeting. Bonita from the Hub and Food Bank gives a regular update. The Food Bank has been running for quite some years now and it has developed over that time. However, everyone volunteers, and it is the only key charity in Totnes that is funded purely by donation with no paid staff. Realising the need for a more secure income stream, the Charity rents another building 2 doors down from the Hub - Freedom Centre Totnes. This is a 'not for profit café' with soft play aimed at preschool families. The income gives steady support to the Hub and Food Bank. They also run some therapy rooms – something that is popular in Totnes. Donations from the Totnes Team, helped to buy some of the lovely toys! Everyone working in the café and therapy rooms is a volunteer. During the pandemic, the café is closed, thus losing income. However, Bonita and the team are now using it as the Food Bank thus enabling the Connection Hub to be used for our street people to access shower and washing facilities whilst keeping to social distancing. Packed lunches and drinks (plus flasks to take away), mobile phone charging, post and computer use are available too. For safety reasons, during the pandemic, food parcels are now being delivered. Bob the Bus delivers to the outlying villages and volunteers deliver locally. As you can imagine take ups has greatly increased, but to keep track people are asked to have a referral form filled in by the Job Centre or CAB. It can be done over the phone. A member of the CAB is working at the hub now. Last week Bonita did a £100 shop to top up the food parcels, this week it was £300. The wonderful Totnes Town Council Clerk, Catherine Marlton told Bonita to pass the bills onto them! Food in Community continue to supply fresh veg from their gleaning at Riverford and worked together over Easter with the Food Bank to prepare recipe Boxes for families in need. FiC continues to give amazing support and are in regular contact with Bonita.

Street people

You may still see people on the streets. Gill the SHDC/ West Devon Rough Sleeper Navigator, knows every one of them including the caravan dwellers. All have been offered B&B accommodation but not everyone chooses to take it up. Gill is working very closely with one particularly vulnerable man and is in touch with his family, but the work is slow and delicate. Gill keeps in regular touch with Bonita and now that the Food Bank is in Freedom centre, the hub can be used by those needing the resources there.

The Kitchen Table

Sima from the Kitchen table (her unit is on the Industrial Estate behind the Hub) has been given extremely generous donations to make 'Pay it Forward' stews for key workers, volunteers and those in need. If you know of anyone you would like to thank or support by giving them one of these stews, do contact her.

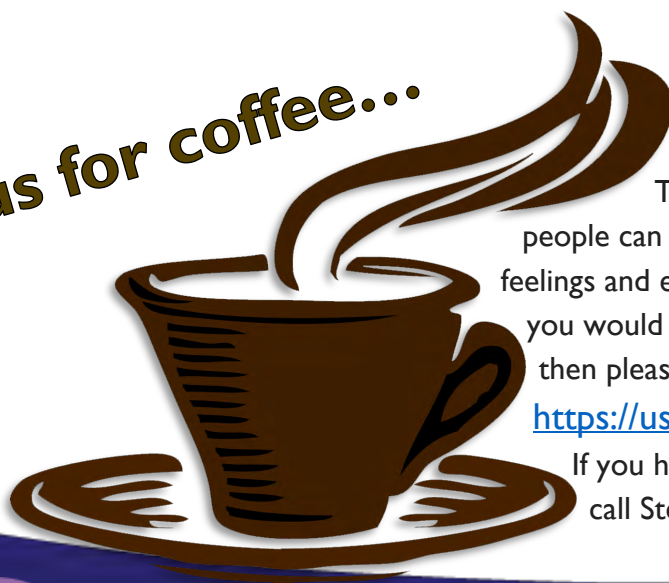
